Snapshot Highlights

Tax revenues (City & PICA) for July totaled \$209.2 million, an almost four percent increase over the same month last year. A breakdown of the total revenues included \$175.3 million into the General Fund and \$33.9 million as the PICA portion.

Wage/Earnings/NPT (City & PICA) collections for the month totaled \$150.8 million, a five percent increase over the same month last year. Almost \$117 million of the total amount collected was provided into the General Fund and the remaining \$33.8 as the PICA portion.

Monthly sales tax collections in July totaled \$22.3 million, a three percent increase compared to last July. Eight of the last 12 months recorded sales tax collections that were higher than the same month from the prior year.


Along with reviewing monthly revenue collections, the Controller's monthly economic report reviewed City revenues collected through by litter violations. In Fiscal Year 2014, these fines generated \$5.1 million into the City's General Fund. The average monthly collection was about \$425,000.

The total amount collected at the end of the last fiscal year was almost 75 percent more than what was collected in Fiscal Year 2009, which recorded \$2.9 million.

Since Fiscal Year 2009, the City has collected more than \$26 million. A review of Agency Receivables maintained by the Department of Revenue indicated that almost \$70 million was owed the City.



Business Outlook Survey

According to the Federal Reserve's latest Business Outlook Survey, the diffusion index of current activity has increased for three consecutive months and has reached a three-year high. Over the last month, the index increased from 23.9 to 28. In addition, the current employment index remained positive for the 14th consecu-

tive month, with 25 percent of firms reporting increases in employment compared to 16 percent reporting decreases.

While current activity and employment indexes increased, the new orders and shipments decreased by 20 points and 18 points, respectively.

The survey also showed that future capital spending decreased from 18.9 last month to 17.5. Twenty-five percent of the firms is expecting an increase, whereas 7.4 percent is expecting a decrease.

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LITTERING ADD\$ UP: \$26 MILLION COLLECTED SINCE FISCAL YEAR 2009

Whether it's garbage, refuse, rubbish, or any other waste that creates a danger to public health or welfare, the City of Philadelphia is charged with issuing citations if it is not properly disposed.

The standard fine for littering is \$150 but the amount can range much higher depending on the violation. Citations are issued by police officers, inspectors in Licenses and Inspections and other city employees authorized to enforce ordinances. This includes the Streets & Walkways Education and Enforcement Program (SWEEP).

Along with ensuring compliance of

littering laws, these violations provide City's the General Fund with millions of dollars

annually. In fact, Litter Fines in Fiscal Year 2014 generated \$5.1 million, which was four percent more than the City had budgeted for the year. The average monthly collection was about \$425,000.

The total amount collected at the end of the last fiscal year was almost 75 percent more than what was collected in Fiscal Year 2009, which recorded \$2.9 million.


Since Fiscal Year 2009, the City has collected more than \$26 million, which has gone directly to the General Fund.

While the City realizes revenues from issuing these fines, there are also millions of dollars that go uncollected. A review of Agency Receivables maintained by the Department of Revenue indicated that \$68.4 million was owed the City. Although, the City considers the majority of this amount to be uncollectible.
