### **Snapshot Highlights**

Tax revenues (City & PICA) for March totaled \$332.8 million, a 24% increase over the same month last year, but it was a 22 percent decrease from the previous month, which is consistent with a decrease in collections from prior years between these two months.

Wage/Earnings/NPT (City & PICA) collections for the month totaled \$135.57 million, a 6% increase compared to the same month last year, and a 17 percent increase from the prior month.

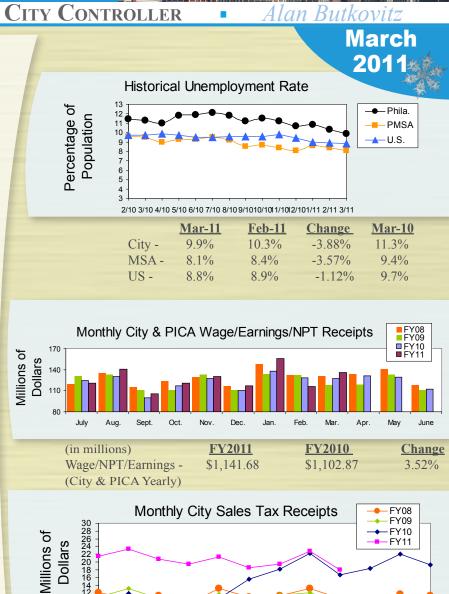
This month's sales tax collections totaled \$18 million, an 8 percent increase compared to March 2010. It also marked the lowest amount collected during the nine months of the current fiscal year.

With the latest Chained Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, which is a special index to measure the actual cost of living for Americans, reaching a record high reading of 128.6 in March, this month's economic report features a look at the increased costs consumers in Philadelphia have incurred over the last decade.

From 2000 to 2010, the average increases for certain costs in Philadelphia include the following: 117% for healthcare costs associated with congested heart failure; 69% for annual tuition at the City's universities; and 20% for a professional sporting event ticket. Also, an adult general admission ticket at the Philadelphia Museum doubled from \$8 to \$16.

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## Forecast Highlights

March 2011∗

According to the latest Philadelphia Federal Reserve's Business Outlook Survey, many of the survey's indicators that have been reporting increases over the last several months have realized lower readings in April<sup>1</sup>.

The diffusion index of current activity, which is the survey's broadest measure of manufacturing conditions, decreased from 43.4 in March to 18.5 this month. After seven consecutive months of increases, the new orders index fell 22 points - from 40.3 last month to 18.8 in the current month. Other decreases included 29 points in the future general activity index and 31 and 22 points for future new orders and shipments, respectively.

The current Business Outlook Survey found that 80 percent of firms indicated no adverse effects from the recent crisis in Japan or other international events on the availability of raw meaterials or other products.

# IN PHILADELPHIA

As the economy slowly looks toward recovery after the latest Great Recession, cost increases for many products and services could play a significant role in how well the United States recovers. The latest Chained Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, which is a special index to measure the actual cost of living for Americans, reached a record high reading of 128.6 in March.

In light of this recorded index increase, this month's economic report features a look at the increased costs consumers in Philadelphia have incurred over the last decade.

When it comes to higher education costs at universities located within the city, the average annual tuition increase

over the last decade has been 69 percent for the universities that provided tuition costs for this report. For those having to pay medical bills covering healthcare costs associated with congested heart failure, there's been a 117 percent increase.

From 2000 to 2010, the average ticket price to a professional sporting event jumped 20 percent, and an adult general admission ticket to the Philadelphia Museum doubled, from \$8 to \$16.

Also of note, in April 2005 in Philadelphia, the average price for regular gas was about \$2.25 compared to the current \$3.90 - a 73 percent increase.
